Dense multi-stemmed with a ground-hugging habit of growth.
Very hardy shrub with medium, bright green color.

Compact, low growing rose that is borne in small clusters of deep pinkish-red and open to dark cherry pink flowers with a dark pink reverse. Everblooming bloom cycle.
The buds open to lovely pink blooms that carry a sweet scent. Provides persistent hips that serve as food for wildlife. Non-recurrent bloom cycle.
Exceptionally fragrant, especially when the stems are pressed or after a storm. Attracts butterflies and birds. Super hardy, good for xeriscaping.
Very similar to Rabbitsbrush. Tough as nails! Leaves are extra thin and appear as long blue-green needles.
Silvery color makes it an attractive addition to landscape. Drought tolerant and important to wildlife.
Berries may be eaten fresh off the plant or used in jams, jellies and pies.
Drought tolerant, attracts wildlife and birds, native, berries good for jellies and pie.
Likes moist locations, flowers in July, white berries in Autumn; good wildlife habitat.
Noted for long season of bloom in areas with a cool climate.
Prefers moist, well-drained soil; great for erosion control.

# SHRUBS

Comments:
Great in rock gardens, low hedges for paths and walkways, and also incorporates well into foundation plantings.
Flowers are produced abundantly on arching branches in early spring before leaves appear.
Vigorous purple-tips on foliage in spring.
Low growing shrub has bright yellow leaves that turn green in the summer.
Low growing and bushy.
Bright lemon-yellow foliage matures to lime green on a compact mounding form.
Small leaves on short wiry stems, flowers bloom in summer, excellent groundcover or dwarf specimen.

Comments:
Prefers moist, well-drained soil; great for erosion control.
Wind tolerant, requires lots of water, fast growing.
Great winter interest with orange-red bark, great as a wind breaker, needs continuous water.
Occupies drier sites than most willows, roots grow as deep into the soil as top growth does in height.

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
